Overall, it has been a fantastic and energetic two months for all of us here at Hockey India. We will keep working towards our goal of revolutionizing hockey in the upcoming months."

























INDIA WON BID TO HOST 2023 MEN'S HOCKEY WORLD CUP

INDIAN MEN'S HOCKEY TEAM TO BEGIN OLYMPIC CAMPAIGN AGAINST NEW ZEALAND AND WOMEN TO TAKE ON THE NETHERLANDS IN THEIR FIRST MATCH IN 2020 TOKYO OLYMPICS

The Indian Men's Hockey Team will take on New Zealand in their opening match at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics on 25 July 2020 while the Indian Women's Team will play against Rio Olympics Silver Medallists The Netherlands on 25th July 2020. The draw for the prestigious quadrennial extravaganza was announced in Tokyo, Japan on 17 December 2019.

Speaking about the draw, Indian Men's Hockey Team Skipper Manpreet Singh said: "A good start will always give the right confidence and momentum to carry on in the tournament so it will be important for us to begin with a win. New Zealand have always posed stiff competition for us and I believe it can be a close game," stated Manpreet further adding that the team will need to keep a check on their nerves. "It is important to keep our nerves in check as opening matches can be a bit overwhelming especially at a major event like the Olympics," Manpreet added.

Meanwhile, the Indian Women's Team Skipper Rani said: "Draw does not matter because in the Olympics every team is equal and every team will come to the Olympics with an aim win. As a team, we need to focus on ourselves and what we can do better on the given day. We are preparing well to ensure we tick all the boxes in each of our match and put all the energy into every game we play and give our best to the blue shirt if we want to see ourselves in the quarter finals and semi finals."

The Quarter Finals for the Women's Hockey will be held on 3 August 2020 while the Semi Finals will be held on 5 August 2020 and the Gold Medal and Bronze Medal matches will be held on 7 August 2020.


ASIAN HOCKEY FEDERATION CONGRESS 2019








HOCKEY INDIA ANNOUNCED HOCKEY INDIA COACHING EDUCATION PATHWAY 2020

Hockey India announced the launch of the Hockey India Coaching Education Pathway 2020 which will be conducted from February - March 2020. The program, which is an integral part of the FIH Academy, will see the Hockey India Level 'Basic' and Level '1' Coaching Courses being conducted across the four zones - South, West, North and East in February 2020, with the Hockey India Level '2' Coaching Course also taking place later in March 2020.

A simplified education structure, the Hockey India Coaching Education Pathway, consists of a combination of web-based modules and face-to-face interactive courses, underpinned by a competency based assessment process, which helps the Coaches in progressing to higher levels. The Pathway is divided into 7 levels: Hockey India Level 'Basic', Hockey India Level '1', Hockey India Level '2', FIH Level 1, FIH Level 2, FIH Level 3 and FIH High Performance. Once a candidate progresses from the Hockey India Levels, they are then eligible to enrol for the FIH Academy Level 1 Course, and so on. In its initial year, this initiative from Hockey India attracted an overwhelming response from across the country with over 300 candidates applying for each March 2019 and August 2019 phases of the Pathway.

Hockey India had launched the first-ever Hockey India Coaching Education Pathway in March 2019, designed with the aim to provide a simplified education structure to help in developing coaches from the grassroots level into world-class coaches of the high performance/international level. With hundreds of candidates having enrolled for the Pathway in 2019, the meticulously-designed program provided certification to candidates including young upcoming hockey coaches who are already coaches or wish to pursue coaching as a career; along with NIS-qualified coaches, and former International Hockey players who have represented India at the highest level in the past.

The Hockey India Coaching Education Pathway 2020 will see the Hockey India 'Basic' and Level '1' Coaching Course for the South Zone take place in Kollam, Kerala from 11th to 13th February 2020, for the West Zone in Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh from 15th to 17th February 2020, for the North Zone in New Delhi from 19th to 21st February 2020, and for the East Zone in Ranchi, Jharkhand from 23rd to 25th February 2020. After the completion of the Hockey India' Basic' and Level '1' Courses across the four Zones, Hockey India Level '2' Coaching Course will be held in New Delhi from 27th to 30th March 2020, which will be conducted for candidates who have successfully cleared the initial two courses.





JR WOMEN - YEAR-IN-REVIEW: INDIAN JUNIOR WOMEN'S HOCKEY TEAM ON THE RIGHT TRACK GOING INTO AN IMPORTANT 2020

The Indian Junior Women's Hockey Team ended the year 2019 on a great high by winning the 3-Nations Tournament in Canberra, Australia, paving the way for more success in the upcoming year where they will be playing some crucial tournaments, and will be looking to secure their place in the next edition of the FIH Hockey Junior Women's World Cup.

The team participated in various tournaments during the year which included Test matches against Ireland and Canada, Cantor Fitzgerald U21 International 4-Nations Tournament in May-June, Series with Belarus in June and the 3-Nations Tournament with New Zealand and Australia in December.

"It was a very positive year for us, we played against some of the best teams from around the world and performed exceedingly well. We focused on raising the level of our performances with every single match, and with some tough challenges against teams like Australia, New Zealand, Ireland, Canada through the year, it was pleasing to see the girls improve with every single tournament and National Camp," said Coach Baljeet Singh Saini.

He continued, "When you play other strong teams from around the world, it helps in giving a lot of exposure to our players, and also makes them aware of what is actually required to be performing consistently at the highest level. I am very happy to see that our team has developed so much over the years, and can now beat any team in the world, regardless of the physicality and built. Our players at the Junior level are getting stronger and fitter, and I am really pleased to see that because these are the players who will progress to play for the Senior team in the future."

Having played a total of 16 matches across various tournaments, the Indian team registered an impressive 10 victories, drew two matches and lost four, but their most important win came in the Cantor Fitzgerald U21 International 4-Nations Tournament which also saw hosts Ireland, Canada and Scotland take part. It was India who took the title as they registered a 1-0 win in the Final match against the hosts with Gagandeep Kaur scoring India's only goal. "It was a good exposure for the team to have played in Europe, and have some matches under their belts. We had some tough matches but our team kept the intensity going and produced good performances to win the tournament," said Saini.

2019 also saw a few of the Indian Junior Team's members progress to the Senior Team set-up, which has pleased Coach Saini. "When you are in-charge of any Junior team, your role is to help the youngsters develop into well-honed players who can match the standards of the Senior team, and also provide something unique to the team. As the Coach, it was something that really pleased me to see two of our players progress to the Senior Team. Salima Tete and Sharmila Devi are both very talented, and have set an example for the other players in our team," said the Coach.

Looking forward to the upcoming year where the team will be taking part in the Junior Women's Asia Cup,

Saini said that the tournament is crucial as it provides direct qualification to the FIH Hockey Junior Women's World Cup. "Our collective aim during the next year will be to win the Junior Women's Asia Cup because winning the tournament will give us direct qualification to the next edition of the FIH Hockey Junior Women's World Cup. There will obviously be other targets also during the course of the next year, and we will start work on them from the next National Camp onwards," Saini stated.





JR MEN - YEAR-IN-REVIEW: WITH A SILVER MEDAL AT THE SULTAN OF JOHOR CUP, THE INDIAN JUNIOR MEN'S HOCKEY TEAM LOOK TO BUILD ON THEIR PERFORMANCE FOR AN ALL-IMPORTANT 2020

The year 2019 saw the Indian Junior Men's Team remain consistent in their overall performance while they improved their overall fitness and also saw the return of Dilpreet Singh in the forwardline after he last played in the 2018 Men's Hockey World Cup.

Although the team began the season with a disappointing outing at the 8 Nations Tournament in Spain, the team produced strong results at the Sultan of Johor Cup in Malaysia where they remained unbeaten against Malaysia (4-2), New Zealand (8-2), Australia (5-1), and drew against Great Britain (3-3) but lost to Japan (3-4). In the Final, however, they put up a strong fight against nemesis Great Britain but lost narrowly (1-2) to bag a Silver medal. Despite the loss, there were plenty of positives that came out of the tournament. "We were consistent throughout the tournament and we saw good improvement in the overall PC conversion rate," expressed Coach BJ Kariappa.

He further highlighted that the structure of the team, improved fitness, temperament and consistency are the positives the team would like to carry forward to the year 2020 where the India Colts will be vying to qualify for the 2021 FIH Junior World Cup. "Next year will definitely be important for the Junior Men's Team. The core group of this team is strong and they have played together for nearly two years so each of them understand their strengths and weak points. Their overall fitness has also improved a lot and I am sure this team will continue to build on their performance and do well in the Junior Asia Cup which will be a priority for 2020," added Coach Kariappa.

He further added that with India playing the FIH Pro League in 2020, he expects some of the India Junior Players to make the cut for the Senior Core Group. "Every year we see some of the junior players graduate to the Senior Core Group. In 2019, we saw players like Sanjay (defender) show consistent performance. Mandeep Mor was effective with his penalty corners too while it was good to see Dilpreet Singh (forward) return to action and played a composed game," Kariappa said.





SR WOMEN - YEAR-IN-REVIEW: INDIAN WOMEN'S TEAM ADAPTED TO A NEW AVATAR OF BEING AGGRESSIVE

Having shed their underdog image, the Indian Women's Team embraced the year 2019 with a singular vision to qualify for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics after narrowly missing the ticket at the 2018 Asian Games where they settled for a Silver. The loss in the final to Japan only made the women's team emerge stronger and aggressive in their matches to come in 2019. Their opening tour of the season in Spain saw them clinch confidence-boosting wins against the FIH Women's World Cup 2018 Silver Medallists Ireland and Bronze Medallists Spain.

A reassuring start to the season meant the women's team began to believe that they can beat higher ranked teams. "I think the fact that many people never believed that we were capable of beating top teams did affect us. Some way, this was affecting the team's morale too but I think this tour to Spain set off a new beginning for Indian Women's Team where we knew we can create historic results," stated Rani, skipper of the Indian team looking back at 2019.

In the following months, the team had a successful outing in Malaysia — clinching the tour with four wins and a draw. They also won the Tour to Korea with two wins and a loss. The team then avenged their loss to Japan in the 2018 Asian Games as they defeated the home team at the important FIH Women's Series Finals in Hiroshima, Japan. This helped the team qualify for the FIH Olympic Qualifiers to be held in Bhubaneswar in November. "I believe the team has grown immensely both mentally and physically this year. Our defeats only made us stronger and we wanted to adapt to the aggressive, attacking game more like how the Dutch women play. We wanted to showcase that winning attitude, which we lacked earlier. I think improving our fitness was a big plus point that made a huge difference to our attitude," explained Rani.

While the team beat China and Japan, drew with Australia in the 2020 Tokyo Olympics Test Event, they won a match, drew three and lost a match against Rio Olympics Gold Medallist Great Britain during their tour to England in September 2019.

The turning point of 2019 was in Bhubaneswar where the women's team played out a successful FIH Olympic Qualifiers against USA. "It was everything we had trained for and we didn't give ourselves any other option but to win. The atmosphere was quite incredible and also nervy as many of us had not experienced the home crowd. Now that we have qualified, next year will be all about taking our game to the next level with further improved fitness because the playing conditions in Tokyo will be quite challenging. While making the top four in the Olympics is the target, we also want to win the Asian Champions Trophy which is before the Olympics. This will give us a good momentum for Tokyo," Rani concluded wishing all the hockey fans a very Happy New Year.





SR MEN - YEAR-IN-REVIEW: INDIAN MEN'S TEAM MAKE POSITIVE STRIDES

The Indian Men's Hockey Team were quick to leave the disappointment of the 2018 Men's Hockey World Cup behind and focused on their lone target for 2019 which was to make the qualification for 2020 Tokyo Olympics. Now that the goal has been accomplished, the core group which reported to National Coaching Camp in Bhubaneswar have set their sights on the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

"I think the year 2019 was full of positives. Our single most important target was to make the Olympic qualification and in that pursuit we improved collectively as a team and performed consistently. I think retaining our World Ranking (No.5) was also a morale boost," expressed skipper Manpreet Singh looking back at the year 2019.

Manpreet also believes that the increase in pool of players who are of international standards was also another big positive for the team in 2019. "We saw quite a few youngsters play their first international match. It is good to have a strong pool of players who have the capabilities of handling the pressure at international level. This is an advantage especially now when we play back-to-back FIH Hockey Pro League matches," he added.

Highlighting the team's goal for this year, Manpreet said: "Our immediate target is to do well in the FIH Hockey Pro League. We had a meeting recently where we gave our feedback to the Chief Coach and we discussed what we need to do if we intend to win against teams like The Netherlands, Belgium and Australia who we play against in January and February."

He further added, "We have nine months to prepare for the Olympics and the plan is to get better and better each day, in each session we train. Under Chief Coach Graham Reid there is already a solid process in place and we just need to keep at it and I am sure the result will follow. The team strongly believes we have a good shot at finishing Top 4 at the Tokyo Olympics and once we make the Semi Finals, it can be anybody's game there onwards."

Having won back-to-back Asian Champions Trophy in 2016 and 2018, the team will aim to claim the title third time in a row when the bi-annual tournament returns in 2020. "It is definitely on our mind to defend the Asian Champions Trophy title. It will be sweet to make it a hat-trick but we would like to take it step-by-step, tournament-by-tournament," an optimistic Manpreet said.





FIH UNVEILED NEW WORLD RANKING SYSTEM FOR 2020

Following 12 months of painstaking research, analysis and testing, the International Hockey Federation (FIH) was delighted to reveal details of the new FIH World Ranking system which will be employed from 1 January 2020.

The fresh approach — which has been approved by the FIH Executive Board — sees a switch from the existing tournament-based World Rankings to a more dynamic, match-based system, one which is designed to increase opportunities for all National Associations to gain rankings points and also provide a better reflection of current performance.

The outgoing FIH World Ranking system has served the sport since 2003, being originally devised to allocate teams into pools at tournaments. The old model operated well on various levels, ranking the top teams who participated in FIH and Continental events with a good level of accuracy whilst also allowing those nations to earn ranking points two to three times per year.

However, the numerous restrictions of the tournament-based system – including the limited opportunities for lower-ranked teams to earn points, the degree of subjectivity required to determine the relative strengths of the five continents in order to calculate continental ranking points, and the fact that over 60 percent of international hockey matches had no ranking points on offer - have provided an ever-strengthening case for a change of approach.


The new match-based World Ranking system involves an exchange of points between the two teams competing in each FIH-sanctioned match played. In short, the number of points exchanged depends on a trio of factors: the result of the match, the relative ranking of the teams and the importance of the match. As well as the aforementioned increased opportunities to earn points, the new model removes much of the subjectivity surrounding continental weighting by creating a system which is fair to all, whilst also encouraging the playing of international matches.

The decision to introduce a new World Ranking system comes at the end of a year-long trial period. Using every official international match played since the end of the Rio 2016 Olympic Games, a working model of the new system was created, allowing for constant monitoring, assessment and adjustment throughout 2019. The results of the test phase indicated that the new system was more dynamic and immediately reflective of current form than the existing World Ranking system and was subsequently approved by the FIH Executive Board.

The introduction of the new system for calculating the FIH World Rankings will not affect the current placements—each nation will start 2020 in the same ranking position and with the same number of ranking points that they finished with in 2019.

The model explained

- Based on the Elo rating system, which is used as the basis of many other sports ranking systems
- When two nations play against each other, a number of ranking points are exchanged between them
- In every match, the number of points gained by one team is exactly matched by the number of points lost by the other
- Teams will win more points for beating teams ranked above them, and therefore teams will lose more
 points for losing to a team ranked below them
- Teams will win less points for beating teams ranked below them, and therefore teams will lose less points for losing to a team ranked above them
- If a draw occurs, the lower ranked team will gain a small number of points and the higher ranked team will lose the same number of points
- The number of points exchanged is dependent on the result of the match (win, lose, shootout win/loss or draw), the importance of the match (part of a major tournament, or a test series for example), and the relative difference in ranking points between the teams before the match


