

HOCKEY INDIA (HI) is the governing body with exclusive mandate to direct and conduct all activities for both men and women's hockey in India. It is recognized by the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India as the sole body responsible towards promoting Hockey in India. Headquartered in New Delhi, Hockey India was established on 20th May, 2009 and is affiliated to the International Hockey Federation (FIH), the Indian Olympic Association (IOA) and Asian Hockey Federation (AHF).

Committed to the development of Hockey in the country, Hockey India with the assistance of Sports Authority of India and Department of Sports, Government of India, trains players at sub-junior, junior and senior level. The governing body engages in Coaching the coaches with International Standard certification programs, educates and equips technical officials and umpires to find a foothold in international arena, provides world-class infrastructure and International exposure for the players besides regular international competition.

Hockey India has also pioneered in bringing top International hockey events to India such as the FIH Men's World Cup in 2010 and 2018, FIH Champions Trophy in 2014, FIH Junior Men's World Cup in 2016, FIH Hockey World League Final in 2017. With its vision to popularize the game and constantly promote it, Hockey India is dedicated to getting our national team(both men and women) into the top three in the world.

With life and sport around the world getting disrupted by the COVID-19 pandemic, Hockey India left no stones unturned to bring back normalcy to the lives of its stakeholders. The major highlights of the year 2020-21 were the resumption of sporting activities in India amid pandemic situations. In April 2020, Hockey India became the first federation to layout and share detailed SOPs and guidelines for resumption of sporting activities. With a proactive approach to tackle the pandemic, Hockey India also conducted various National Championships in March 2021, including exclusive tournaments for academies.1st Hockey India Sub Junior Women Academy National Championship 2021 and 1st Hockey India Junior Women Academy National Championship 2021 were being held at the iconic Kalinga stadium in Bhubaneswar.

### **About Team Partner Odisha**

Odisha - the Eastern State of India - is known for its love for Hockey. The State successfully hosted the Odisha Hockey Men's World Cup Bhubaneswar 2018 and hosted the FIH Men's Series Finals Bhubaneswar Odisha 2019 in June. Odisha has previously hosted the Champions Trophy 2014 and the Odisha Men's Hockey World League Final Bhubaneswar 2017. Kalinga Lancers, the team owned by the State, is the winners in the Hockey India League 2017. Taking a step further towards realising the dream of restoring the glory of Indian Hockey at the global level, the State is sponsoring the Indian Hockey Teams till 2023

# INDIA'S OLYMPIC HISTORY



India first participated at the Olympic Games in 1900, with a lone athlete (Norman Pritchard) winning two Silver Medals in athletics. The nation first sent it's team to the Summer Olympic Games in 1920, and has participated in every Summer Games since then. India has also competed at several Winter Olympic Games beginning in 1964. Indian athletes have won a total of 28 Medals, all at the Summer Games.

For a period of time, the Indian national field hockey team was dominant in Olympic competition, winning Eleven Medals in twelve Olympics between 1928 and 1980. The run included 8 Gold Medals in which six Gold Medals were in succession from 1928-1956.

From 1948 onwards, because of the Indian Olympic Association's wider outreach, India began sending delegation of over 50 sport persons representing several sports - each selected by its sports federation - to the Olympics.


At the 2016 Summer Olympics, a record number of 117 Indian athletes competed. Sakshi Malik became the first Indian woman wrestler to win an Olympic Medal with her Bronze Medal finish in Women's freestyle 58 kg category. Shuttler P. V. Sindhu became the first Indian woman to win a Silver Medal in Olympics and also the youngest Indian Olympic medallist.

# HISTORY OF HOCKEY IN OLYMPICS



The inaugural Olympic Hockey Competition for men was held in London in 1908 with England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales competing separately. With the addition of Germany and France, the competition ran with six teams.

After having made its first appearance at the London Games, hockey was subsequently dropped from the 1912 Stockholm Games after host nations were granted control over 'optional sports'. It reappeared in 1920 in Antwerp after pressure from Belgian hockey advocates before being omitted again in Paris in 1924.

The formation of the International Hockey Federation in 1924 was not soon enough for the Paris Olympics but it did grant hockey re-entry in Amsterdam in 1928. Hockey has been on the programme ever since, with women's hockey included for the first time in Moscow in 1980.

For a long time, India dominated at the Olympics, winning the men's Gold Medals in seven out of eight Olympics from 1928 to 1964. Olympic field hockey games were first played on artificial turf at the 1976 Montreal Olympic Games.

Until 1988 the Olympics were invitational, however FIH introduced qualification system for the Olympic Games since the 1992 games.

India is the leading team in overall medal tally with 11 Medals (8 Gold, 1 Silver and 2 Bronze). India also leads in most number of Gold Medals in hockey.

# ABOUT TOKYO OLYMPICS 2020

The 2020 Summer Olympics officially known as the Games of the XXXII Olympiad and also known as Tokyo 2020, is an upcoming international multi-sport event scheduled to be held from 23 July to 8 August 2021 in Tokyo, Japan. Originally scheduled to take place from 24 July to 9 August 2020, the event was postponed in March 2020 as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite being rescheduled for 2021, the event retains the Tokyo 2020 name for marketing and branding purposes. This is the first time that the Olympic Games have been postponed and rescheduled, rather than cancelled. The Summer Paralympics will be held between 24 August and 5 September 2021 after the Olympics.

Tokyo was selected as the host city during the 125th IOC Session in Buenos Aires, Argentina on 07 September 2013. The 2020 Games will mark the second time that Japan has hosted the Summer Olympic Games, the first being also in Tokyo in 1964, making this the first city in Asia to host the Summer Olympic Games twice.

The 2020 Games will see the introduction of new competitions including 3x3 Basketball, Freestyle BMX, and Madison Cycling, as well as further mixed events. Under new IOC policies, which allow the host organizing committee to add new sports to the Olympic program to augment the permanent core events, these Games will see Karate, Sport Climbing, Surfing, and Skateboarding make their Olympic debuts, as well as the return of Baseball and Softball for the first time since 2008.

# OLYMPIC TORCH RELAY TOKYO 2020

The Olympic flame is a symbol used in the Olympic movement. It is also a symbol of continuity between ancient and modern games. Several months before the Olympic Games, the Olympic flame is lit at Olympia, Greece. This ceremony starts the Olympic torch relay, which formally ends with the lighting of the Olympic cauldron during the opening ceremony of the Olympic Games. The flame then continues to burn in the cauldron for the duration of the Games, until it is extinguished during the Olympic closing ceremony.

The concept for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Torch Relay across Japan will be "Hope Lights Our Way", uniting the Japanese people around messages about supporting, accepting and encouraging one another.

The Olympic flame is often associated with a message of peace and hope, as it is carried around the host nation, and as such has become one of the most powerful symbols of the Olympic Movement. In 2020, the Olympic flame will not only symbolise the sunrise of a new era spreading the hope that will light our way, but will also serve to spread the joy and passion of the Japanese around the Olympic Movement as the Games approach.

Upon its arrival in Japan, the Olympic flame initially was put on display at various locations in the Tohoku region, to help underscore this message of hope in the areas affected by the 2011 Earthquake and Tsunami.







# (miraitowa) TOKYO OLYMPICS 2020

The Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games mascot is styled with the Ai (indigo blue) Ichimatsu pattern from the Tokyo 2020 Games emblem, a tribute to both the respected tradition and modern innovation of Japanese culture.

MIRAITOWA has a personality inspired by the Japanese proverb, "learn from the past and develop new ideas". MIRAITOWA is cheerful and remarkably athletic, with a very strong sense of integrity. It has a special power to instantly teleport anywhere it wants.

#### **ORIGIN OF THE NAME**

The name MIRAITOWA is based on the Japanese words "mirai", meaning "future", and "towa", meaning "eternity", representing the wish that the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games will lead to a future of everlasting hope in the hearts of everyone around the world.

### Oi Hockey Stadium

#### **Venue Overview**

The Oi Hockey Stadium has been constructed in the Oi Pier Ocean Park and will host the Olympic Hockey Games. Oi Hockey Stadium contains four pitches, including two competition pitches and two training pitches. During the Games, the second training pitch will be used as the warm-up pitch and shared by the two competition pitches. The field of play and all equipment will be presented in accordance with the FIH Rules of Hockey. The pitches at Oi Hockey Stadium certified to FIH Global Elite standard, with in-situ irrigation systems. The pitches are blue in colour.



The preparations for marquee event like Olympics have been unusual this time. COVID-19 pandemic situations brought everything to a grinding halt, including Tokyo Olympics, which was delayed by a year. However, the Indian Senior Men's Hockey Team took the postponement positively and looked to another year as an advantage to prepare well. Having spent one-and-a-half-year under bio-bubble restrictions at the National Camp at SAI Centre, Bengaluru, the Indian Men's team are geared up in all the possible ways for the prestigious Olympic Games 2020.

Hockey India and SAI never let the COVID-19 pandemic disrupt Indian men's team's Olympic preparations as they provided them a secured environment to train at SAI Centre. They have been in constant touch with the squad members to ensure a safe environment at the national camp. The men's team traveled to Europe and Argentina to test their year-long preparations. Having put up a good show against teams like Germany, Great Britain and reigning Olympic Champions Argentina on the tours, the World No.4 side are pumped up for the Tokyo Olympics. The Indian team also got a chance to return to high-level competition like FIH Pro League, where they defeated Argentina in both the matches and set the tone for the Olympics.

Despite the second wave of deadly virus and travel restrictions, the Indian men were still able to continue their training at the National camp. They approached the situation pragmatically and continued their preparations by making full use of technology and other training facilities provided by SAI and Hockey India.

With a strong build up to Olympics both on and off field, the Indian Men's Hockey Team are upbeat about scripting history at Tokyo Olympics.

Last time I was bit nervous because I was very young, but now I have gained experience, and there's a responsibility to make crucial contributions to the team. Looking at the current situations, I feel it's going to be a challenging one, but we are well prepared and up for any kind of challenges thrown at us."

While in lockdown too, the teams with the help of support staff worked on keeping fit with indoor workouts and mental conditioning that helped them cope with the challenging times.

The year 2021 began positively with the team getting an opportunity to travel to Argentina and then to Germany where they posed stiff

challenge to the home teams with gritty performances. This experience in Argentina and Germany have put the team in a good stead ahead of the Tokyo Olympic Games.

Though the travel restrictions due to the second wave forced the team to remain in SAI Centre, Bengaluru and continue their preparations, they have ensured this is not a setback in their preparations but have engaged in internal matches to gain that match momentum before leaving for Tokyo. With a larger group of players in the Olympic Core Group (25 players), it made it possible for them to play matches among themselves and also test different combinations to ensure only the best 16 are picked for the prestigious Games.

Over the past four-five years, this group of players have shown a lot of promise and are confident of creating history in Tokyo.
